To facilitate things, I've set up the gmail account to forward everything to my "at home" account (wandrew of compuserve.com). This will be especially helpful on deadline days as I can work on the subzine during lunch (hint, hint).

Review: Babylon 5: The Scripts of J. Michael Straczynski (Vol 1) (2005; 454p). BY POPULAR DEMAND

The goal is to pick something that fits the category and will be the "most popular" answer. You score points based on the number of entries that match yours.
